The Importance of Togetherness

From the beginning of the church there was togetherness (Acts 2:42-47). Those who believed were together and had all things in common. Perhaps our abhorrence of communism has caused us to skim over these texts as irrelevant, but let us not confuse government-imposed sharing of the wealth with the voluntary spirit of brotherhood.

The Jerusalem church continued with one accord in the temple, and this togetherness even spilled over into house-to-house togetherness on a smaller scale. Brethren, for us to be an influence and encouragement to one another we need to spend time together.

Certainly in some churches the problems of sinful attitudes are so acute that some might question whether assembling is as valuable as I am making it out to be. The church in Corinth was coming together supposedly to eat the Lord's Supper, but their divisiveness and selfishness was making that impossible (1 Corinthians 11:17-21). In light of the problem, it would seem that the easiest solution would have been to just have everyone stay home. However, despite the negativity associated with their assembly, the solution that Paul offers is not to quit coming together (or to break into two assemblies), but to wait for one another (vs. 33). The Lord's Supper is the only congregational fellowship meal authorized, and churches are supposed to take it together. Apparently Paul thought being together was important.

Assembling together is something that we arenot supposed to neglect. It is an important forum in which to motivate one another to do what is right (Hebrews 10:23-25). Think about those who were reading this letter in the first century. Most are agreed that the motive for the letter seems to be to encourage Jewish Christians to remain faithful despite the strong pressures to return to Judaism.

These were very likely persecuted people. Persecution may have been one of the main reasons that people were neglecting to assemble. Assemblies, groups, and multitudes are much more conspicuous. Still, they were admonished not to forsake this important time together. Is persecution the reason why so many neglect their assembling with the church today? If our persecuted brethren of the first century were told not to forsake this important time together, and to do it all the more often, what would our twentyfirst century brethren be told?

Our comfortable affluence has us convinced that we don't really need to spend time together. We are self-sufficient and "have need of nothing," (Revelation 3:17). It is just another way in which we are deceived by riches and become unfruitful (Mark 4:19). Don't be so proud of your independence, and don't put your trust in your self-sufficiency but in the living God who is the giver of all good things. "Be rich in good works, ready to give, willing to share" (even your time), that you may "lay hold on eternal life" (1 Timothy 6:17-19). ~via *Think On These Things*; Cortland, Illinois.

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Sin Is "Against God"

If you steal my rifle, you will do me a grave injustice. Realizing this, you may decide to return the rifle and ask my forgiveness. You may throw in a new scope to make me happy, but you have not paid your just dues.

Perhaps you think I mean your debt to society. Well, we have obligations to our fellowmen, and the courts may exact a fine, or place you in jail for stealing the rifle. But you could completely satisfy me, wipe clean the records of the court, and still fail the obligations of justice. In fact, we have not yet given consideration to the primary matter.

In the initial act of stealing the rifle you not only did me an injustice, you not only sinned against our society – far more important, you failed your intended purpose and rejected the authority of your Maker. You have sinned against God! This is the fundamental factor in sin, yet it is the part very often ignored – both in recognizing sin, and in "making things right." God existed prior to society, and deserves the prior consideration. All sin is against God!

David got right to the point when he prayed, "Against thee, thee only, have I sinned, and done that which is evil in thy sight" (Psalm.51:4). On this basis God was just in condemning and David looked to God for forgiveness. We need many Davids today.

Christ has the prodigal son confess, "Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in thy sight" (Luke 15:21). The order is significant. Twice this statement is made in the parable, and always, "against heaven" first. How differently we might look upon our sins if this order would prevail.

Paul says "godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death" (2 Corinthians 7:10). It is not enough that we "regret" our sins. Such regrets may stem from getting caught. Our sorrow must be in recognition of our failure before God, and our turning in keeping with His will. It is this concept of sin that makes us aware of its depth, and of our complete dependence upon God for forgiveness. Next time you sin don't "look out" – look up".

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What Is Inspiration?

The word "inspired" is used only once in the NT. It is a translation of the word theopneustos as found in 2 Timothy 3:16. "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." Literally, the word means "Godbreathed." Of course, a number of passages refer to the Holy Spirit as the source of inspiration (Acts 2:4; Hebrews 3:7; 2 Peter 1:21). Inspiration is of God! Men were the instruments chosen by God to speak and write His word.

Jesus promised inspiration to His apostles as they

did their work of preaching. "But when they deliver you up, do not worry about how or what you should speak. For it will be given to you in that hour what you should speak; for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father who speaks in you" (Matthew 10:19-20). The human element does not in any way diminish the message of God. Even recognizing the particular vocabulary, language, and personality of God's human agents does not in any way mitigate against the message truly, actually coming from God. Paul said in 1 Corinthians 2:13: "These things we also speak, not in words which man's wisdom teaches but which the Holy Spirit teaches, comparing spiritual things with spiritual." Paul was an educated man (Acts 22:3). He wrote in the Greek language. He used language and arguments that people in the 1st century would and could understand. That does not lesson the impact or import of the words that came from him; he was "taught by the Spirit."

Jesus said: "Heaven and earth will pass away, but My words will by no means pass away" (Mark 13:31). We have confidence that God's word has been translated accurately, transmitted faithfully, and preserved in total for us today. There are literally 1000s of Greek manuscripts that can be and have been studied. The task of examining these ancient documents is exacting; the end result is that we can have confidence that we have God's word accurately written, preserved, and transmitted.

You and I need to do what Paul told Timothy to do in 2 Timothy 2:15. "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." It takes time and hard work to truly study God's word. It takes an honest heart. Such an endeavor should be one of the main priorities in our lives today. Since we will face the message from God in judgment, it is important that we have confidence in it and that we know what it says. "He who rejects Me, and does not receive My words, has that which judges him; the word that I have spoken will judge him in the last day" (John 12:48).

Faith and reason are joined in handling aright God's word. We have His message. Reason examines and evaluates that message. Such an exercise helps us appreciate the inspiration of the Bible.
