Confusion & Transgression

Have you ever heard anyone say, as an explanation for some sinful action, "I have become so confused I don't know what is right anymore?" As a rule, the person who says such a thing is one who has had clear convictions but has acted, or is about to act, contrary to them. This must be what the Holy Spirit was saying about Eve in 1 Timothy 2:14. "Adam was not deceived, but he woman being deceived, fell into transgression."

To say that she was decided is not to say that she was ignorant. She quoted perfectly what God had said: "We may eat of the fruit of the trees of the garden; but of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God has said, 'You shall not eat of it, nor shall you touch it, lest you die" (Genesis 3:2-3). She was deceived when she thought there could be any valid reason for disobeying God.

We cannot know how long Adam and Eve avoided the forbidden tree. With so many other trees from which to eat, there was no need to eat of it. There is no evidence on confusion regarding the right and wrong of eating or the wisdom of abstaining. They were happy ignoring it. But along came Satan to draw Eve's attention to the tree she had been avoiding. He drew her attention to the beauty of the fruit and somehow convinced her, perhaps by eating of it himself, that it was good for food. If he did eat of it, the fact that he did not die surely gave support to this contention that she would not die. One can see the confusion mounting. The arguments she had considered conclusive against eating were rapidly being matched by arguments for doing so. Which arguments were valid? Both seemed to be.

Had Adam been nearby, or had God spoken again, she might have been reminded once more of the strong reasons for rejecting the fruit. But as it was, the voice of God grew weaker in her memory as the desirability of the fruit was magnified by Satan's glib lies. All that was needed to the balance was the final suggestion of an apparent virtue in eating — the thought that she would become like God. Never mind the legalist prohibition; surely one could not be blamed for wanting to be like God. "She took of the fruit and ate" (Genesis 3:6). Tragic words! Tragic consequences! Consequences reaching down through countless generations even to us! The great mistake of Eve was in allowing herself even to begin thinking about disobedience. This was the mistake of Achan when he first saw the Babylonian garment (Joshua 7:21), of David when he first saw his beautiful neighbor bathing (2 Samuel 11:2) and of Judas when his first thought of betraying Jesus. It is the same mistake each of us makes — men and women alike — whenever we sin.

The Bible says as much: "Each one is tempted when he is drawn away by his own desires and enticed. Then, when desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, brings froth death" (James 1:14-15). There is ample defense available. If we are wise enough to mediate on God's laws in such circumstances (Psalm 119:11), and to ask Him for deliverance (Matthew 6:13), He will, with the temptation, "also make the way of escape" (1 Corinthians 10:13).

But all too often, in the name of open mindedness and objectivity, we feel we are obligated to look at the other side, to consider the "arguments in favor of" sin. We may even be so foolish as to parrot the existential line: "I must get away to myself and sort things out." If this means getting away for Bible study, meditation and prayer, fine! But this is seldom what it means. As a rule, what it means is: "I want to be left alone to rationalize my way through the sin that entices me without having to reason with those who would logically or scripturally expose my folly."

Such conflict between conscience and passion, between logic and emotion, between authority and anarchy, between flesh and spirit will indeed produce confusion — confusion bordering on insanity. But it is a confusion for which we are responsible. It is the peculiar malady of "those who perish because they did not receive the love of the truth, that they might be saved" and who "did not believe the truth but had pleasure in unrighteousness" (2 Thessalonians 2;10,12). It is never surprising when such a person, "being deceived," falls into transgression. In Jesus' day, "there was a division among the people because of Him" (John 7:43). They were confused by the contradictions between His claims and the accusations of their rulers. Jesus stated clearly who would not be confused: "If anyone wants to do His will, he shall know concerning the doctrine,

whether it is from God or whether I speak of My own authority" (John 7:17).

Wanting to do God's will, will save us from the confusion, deception and transgression into which our mother fell.

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Authority In Religion

Jesus Christ has **all authority**. Moses prophesied, "The Lord thy God will rise up unto thee a Prophet from the midst of thee, to thy brethren, like unto me; unto him ye shall hearken," (Deuteronomy 18:15,19). Peter applied this Mosaic prophecy to Jesus in Acts 3:19-26. God said, "Hear him" (Matthew 17:5)! Jesus said, "All authority hath been given to me in heaven and on earth," (Matthew 28:18). This leaves no authority for me, John Calvin, Mary Baker Eddy, Martin Luther, Joseph Smith, John Wesley, a Pope, or anyone else. The question is, "*What did Jesus do with his authority?*"

Jesus placed His authority in His word, the word that He spoke. Christ said, "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day," (John 12:48). If the word of Christ is that by which we are to be judged, then it behooves us to know what He said as compared to what others are saying. Also, if we are to be judged by His word, it makes no difference what **we say**, what **we think**, or how **we feel** in religious matters. Christ's authority was not placed in Men, Councils, Assemblies, Ecumenical Groups, Catechisms, Disciplines, Creeds, Manuals, or Confessions of Faith. Christ's authority was placed only in his word.

Jesus' all-authoritative word was given from His mouth to His apostles. In His prayer, Jesus said, "For I have given unto them the words which thou gavest me... I have given them thy word," (John 17:8, 14, 18, 20). Christ promised the apostles help in remembering His word, saying, "These things I have spoken unto you, being yet present with you. But the Comforter, which is the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you," (John 14:25-26). Paul could not have declared "the whole counsel of God" unless he had received Christ's word (Acts20:27). Peter could only have received "all things that pertain unto life and godliness" and his knowledge of Christ through that word (2Peter1:3). But, what did the apostles do with that authoritative word?

Jesus commissioned His apostles to preach His word (Matthew 28:18-20; Mark16:15-16). Their obedience to His command is shown in The Acts of The Apostles. Paul declared the word had been "preached to every creature which is under heaven" in his lifetime (Colossians1:23). Besides preaching the all-authoritative word of Christ, the apostles wrote it. In First Corinthians 15:1-4, Paul said he was making known, in a letter, the things which he first received. The Thessalonians were urged to "stand fast" and "hold" that which they had been taught, whether by word of mouth or by his first epistle to them (2 Thessalonians 2:15). Paul emphatically declared, "The things that I write unto you are the commandments of the Lord," (1Corinthians 14:37). Therefore, that which he wrote was the all-authoritative word he had received from Christ through the Holy Spirit.

The all-authoritative word Christ was written for our benefit. Luke's purpose for writing was, "that thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed," (Luke 1:1-4). "...these things are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life in his name," was the purpose for writing the Gospel of John (John 20:30-31). Paul's purpose for writing was that "when ye read, ye may understand my knowledge in the mystery of Christ," (Ephesians 3:4). Again, John wrote, "These things write we unto you, that your joy may be full," and "these things write unto you, that ye sin not," (1 John 1:4; 2:1). Are the words written by the inspired writers sufficient to guide us in religion?

John 20:30-31 tells us that it was written so we could believe and thereby be saved. John 2:1 tells us that it was written to keep us from sinning. It is through the written word of God that we have been "given all things that pertain unto life and godliness," (2 Peter 1:3). Paul's statement, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." 2Timothy 3:16-17, should prove that the **word** of the inspired writers is the sufficient guide for us today. If the all-authoritative word furnishes us with **all things**, do we need the catechisms, creeds, dogmas, or manuals written by uninspired, fallible men? Certainly **not**!
