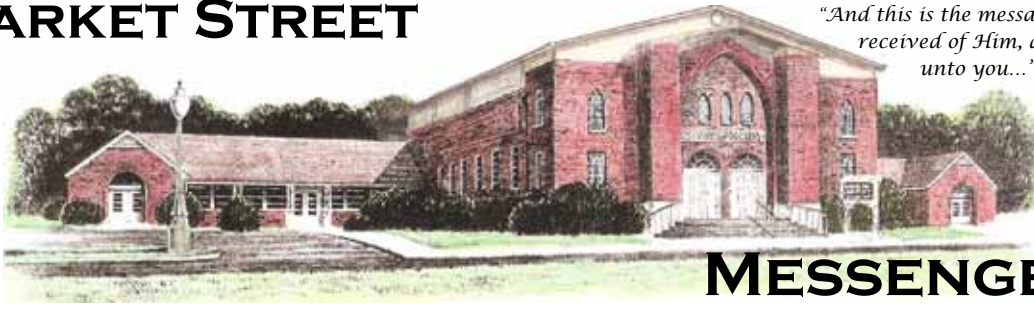

Learn To Forgive, As God Forgives

When the civil war was nearing its end, Abraham Lincoln was successfully elected to his second term as president of the United States. At this time, he faced the intimidating task of trying to bring the country back together. As he prepared for his second Inaugural Address, he had received much advice to deal sternly with the Confederate States. On March 4, 1865, President Lincoln delivered an address with words of much compassion toward those that had been enemies during the war. Lincoln made a statement saying things like: "with malice toward none" or "with charity for all." He was calling on people to forgive the past and build for the future. From history, we learn that after the assassination of Lincoln that his appeals for forgiveness were not carried out; and vengeance won at the end of the day.

Forgiveness does not seem the natural way for a man to react. "I will forgive, but I won't forget" seems to be the motto that is lived by with so many. Perhaps this is the reason why Jesus, early in his ministry, dealt with the subject of forgiveness in the "Sermon on the Mount." Jesus, giving an example of prayer for his disciples, said, "And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors" (Matthew 6:12). Jesus then gave this instruction following the prayer, "For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Matthew 5:14-15). It is clear from this that men need to learn to forgive: one who does not forgive, will not be forgiven by God.

What Does It Mean to Forgive?

Too many believe that forgiveness is merely a ceasing of hostile actions toward another. Often there is a willingness to place the one that committed a wrong on probation, but not a full restoration as if nothing ever happened. To truly understand forgiveness we must see how God does it. When God forgives sin:

1. **He pardons our sin.** He removes the very thought of the transgression from Him (Hebrew 10:17). An example of this in Luke 15. The main character in this parable, the forgiving father, is a picture of God. The

father receives the son back that had sinned against him and was not worthy to be called his son. As the son returns to the father the text reads, "But when he was still a great way off, his father saw him and had compassion, and ran and fell on his neck and kissed him. And the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and in your sight, and am no longer worthy to be called your son.' "But the father said to his servants, 'Bring out the best robe and put it on him, and put a ring on his hand and sandals on his feet. And bring the fattened calf here and kill it, and let us eat and be merry; for this my son was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.' And they began to be merry" (Luke 15:20-24).

2. **He treats us just like the sin never happened.** In Luke 15, the father forgave the son and restored him back in the position he had left. The best robe was put on him to wear; the ring was placed on his finger and shoes on his feet. This son wanted to be a servant, but the father wanted him back as his son; with forgiveness that is possible. Without a doubt, God is seen receiving us back into his love, favor, and fellowship unconditionally. God greatly loves us and patiently waits for us to repent so He can show us His great mercy.

Having a Heart of Forgiveness

Forgiving is a difficult thing to do, but we must learn to do so. We must develop a heart for forgiveness. When you examine the word "forgive" you will see the word "give." That word is vital when it comes to having a heart of forgiveness. We must give before we can forgive.

We must give up pride, the delusion that we are always right, and always having our way. Until we can give up these things, it will be impossible for us to forgive as we should. We may call it forgiveness, but there will always be expectations beyond the contrite heart that we will expect. We must learn that we cannot control the lives of people and all the things around us. We must allow others to make the choices in their lives and for their lives. We must let God control us and let the word work through us and into the lives of those around us. The heart of forgiveness must always possess the willingness to forgive. Remember Jesus taught his disciples not to forgive until "seven times, but up to seventy times seven" (Matthew 18:22).

May we work to develop a heart that is tender and genuinely forgives as God forgives.

The Powerful Authority of Christ

Jesus Christ has all authority. There's no question that He is "before" all things (Colossians 1:17). There's no doubt that the authority that was given to Him is an authority that transcends earth's realm (Matthew 28:18). The power of Jesus' authority needs to be appreciated not just because of its totality but also because it is powerful in transforming our lives. Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth about this incredible authority when he addressed the subject of those who wouldn't go to heaven. After listing a number of different sins that would disqualify a person from making it into heaven, the apostle writes, "And such were some of you. But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God" (1 Corinthians 6:11). Of course, without the authority of Christ, none of these three powerful things could have occurred.

Through Christ's authority each of us can have our sins "washed" away. When Saul was being taught by Ananias, Ananias asked Saul why he was waiting and stressed the need to "wash away" his sins (Acts 22:16). To dispel any notion otherwise, the scriptures teach that this "washing" has nothing to do with physical filth but everything to do with a spiritual renewal. Peter writes that our baptism is our answer of good consciences toward God (1 Peter 3:21). For anyone who has done wrong and then "made it right," there's nothing "better" than the feeling of being washed with a good conscience!

The authority of Christ also allows us to be sanctified. This act of being "made holy" and separate from the world is key to pleasing God. Paul wanted the Corinthians to understand the importance of separating themselves from the world and from their own past lives. The same must be true for us. Rendering obedience to the One who gave His life for us is the only way to do this. By the authority of the Holy One, each of us can be holy too.

Finally, it is through Christ's powerful authority that we are justified or "rendered innocent" of our wrongdoing. Of course, as sinners, we're far from being innocent. But therein lies one of the greatest observations about our God. He loves us so much that, even though we don't deserve it, He'll make it so that we "appear" innocent in His sight. After all, it is only through this magnificent grace that we can make it to heaven. Thanks be to God, not only for His mercy, but for the powerful authority

of Christ Jesus who made all these things possible and gives each of us immeasurable hope!

“Lead Us Not Into Temptation”

“And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one” (Matthew 6:13a). This phrase in the model prayer continues the focus upon our spiritual needs. As sheep in the Lord’s fold, we are in need of His guidance and protection as we walk through this world of sin and darkness (Psalm 23).

God allows us to suffer and to be tempted as a means of growing and developing (James 1:12-13). He may not cause the temptation and suffering, but we know God is able to control the tempter (Job 1:12; 2:6; Luke 22:31-32). He is faithful not to allow us to be tempted in a way or to a measure that is beyond our ability to resist (1 Corinthians 10:13).

Prayer is one of the weapons God has given us in our battle against temptation. On the night that Jesus was betrayed, He told Peter, James, and John to, “watch and pray, lest you enter into temptation” (Matthew 26:41a). Instead of blindly walking into the Devil’s minefield every day, we should stop and ask the Lord to lead us away from these temptations and deliver us from the evil one.

This guidance and deliverance is not miraculous. We are guided by God’s word, and we are delivered by God’s providence. However, much like receiving our physical needs, we are to ask for this guidance and deliverance, with the faith that God is willing and able to provide.

While forgiveness of sins is available, it is God’s will that we do not sin (1 John 2:1). We need help, guidance, and strength in resisting the temptations that appear in our daily lives. Perhaps if we spent more time requesting God’s help in avoiding and resisting temptations, we would have to spend less time asking God to forgive us for our sins.
