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# The Widow's Mite — A Challenge to All of Us

I don't know about you, but the lesson of the destitute widow and her response of sacrifice especially convicting (Mark 12:41-44). It is obvious she went "all in" for the All in All. She held nothing back. While others gave from their surplus, she sacrificed.

And that's what it comes down to. Let's lay the cards on the table. It comes down to this: surplus or sacrifice. You will give from one or the other.

The warning of scripture is clear. "It is hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven" Matthew 19:23). It is hard but not impossible. Jesus followed up that declaration with this one: "...but with God all things are possible" (v.26b). He then found a rich man (Zaccheus) who was willing to sacrifice for the Cause. The impossible became possible.

It raises the question: "Does God expect me to give up my house, sell my car, and liquidate my assets?" Yes—if they come between you and Him (aka rich young ruler).

If your stuff is more important than your Savior, you have a problem. Seriously, He demands #1. And He knows. He knows if you are all in or if you are holding back. He knows if you give out of your surplus or if you sacrifice. He knows all.

### Who Are the Rich?

You tell me.

Let's say 100 people represent the world's population. If so, 53 of those people live on less than \$2 per day. Are you kidding me? No. And if you make \$4000 per month, you are one hundred times wealthier than the average person on the planet. All of which asks... Which is more convoluted—that we have so much more than everyone else or that we don't think we are rich?

"Instruct those who are rich in this present world not to be conceited or to fix their hope on the uncertainty of riches, but on God... Instruct them to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share..." (1 Timothy 6:17-18). Jesus loves us enough to tell us the truth.

Brethren, this should serve as a wakeup call to all of us. It's easy to

gloss over scenes like the rich young ruler or the poor widow, but we do so to our own peril. Let us examine our lives and ask one simple question:

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# Baptism Does Not...

The Bible has much to say on the subject of baptism. The Book of God tells us that baptism is for remission of sin (Acts 2:38); that it saves us (Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21); it puts us into Christ where all spiritual blessings are (Romans 6:3; Ephesians 1:3); through this act we can become the children of God (Galatians 3:26-28); it is to be preceded by faith, repentance and confession of our faith that Jesus is Lord (Acts 8:36,37; 2:38); and the mode of baptism is immersion (Acts 8:38; Romans 6:4).

It seems that the vast majority of the religious world rejects the idea that baptism has anything to do with the forgiveness of sin. As noted above, their claim is totally false. Yet we have some brethren who take the Bible teaching on baptism to the other extreme, thinking that it is a kind of cure all problem with regard to sin, without ever repenting. This teaching is erroneous as well!

One cannot continue to practice sin after he has been baptized into Christ. Paul, in writing to the Corinthians, said, "Do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived. Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor homosexuals, nor sodomites, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners will inherit the kingdom of God. And such were some of you. But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God"(1 Corinthians 6:9-11). They had been guilty of all of these things, but no longer did they practice them ("such were some of you"). Now they had been washed in the blood of the Lamb (Acts 22:16), set apart by God to be used in His service, and declared just in His sight.

Baptism does not make unlawful marriage lawful. If it was an adulterous relationship before baptism, it is still an adulterous relationship after baptism. One who was involved in homosexuality before baptism cannot continue to practice such after baptism. Baptism washes away the sins that had been committed upon one's repentance. When men and women were told to repent, before baptism, it meant they had to turn from sin to God and they were not to continue in them.

To say that one is not subject to the law of Christ before baptism is to teach something that the Lord's will did not reveal. How did the Corinthians become guilty of fornication, adultery, etc. if they were not subject to that law? How would one become a sinner in need of salvation if he has not violated the law of God? In writing to those at Thessalonica, Paul said, "in flaming fire taking vengeance on those who do not know God, and on those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Thessalonians 1:8). Will He take vengeance on those who have not submitted to the gospel of Jesus Christ? He said so! Does this not indicate that those who fail to obey are subject to that gospel? Sure it does. Likewise, just because one has been baptized, such does not guarantee that heaven will be that person's home. I don't personally know of anyone who is a member of the Lord's church that believes in the doctrine of once saved always saved. Yet I know several who live as if they believe such to be the truth. Baptism does not automatically punch your ticket to God's eternal abode. It takes faithful living on the part of each individual. Jesus said, "And you will be hated by all for My name's sake. But he who endures to the end will be saved" (Matthew 10:22). Notice a similar statement made in Revelation 2:10, the later part of that verse, "Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life."

Baptism does not solve all the problems associated with sin in one's life. You may well need to repent and be baptized for the remission of your sins like those on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:36-38). They turned away from their iniquities, like the Corinthians, and served God. Or you may have been baptized for the remission of your transgressions and you have allowed sin, with its allurements, to overtake you. You need to repent and pray like Peter told Simon. "Repent therefore of this your wickedness, and pray God if perhaps the thought of your heart may be forgiven you" (Acts 8:22). May we all be willing to submit

to God's plan of forgiveness so that each might stand washed, sanctified, and justified in the sight of our Lord.

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# Toward Better Communication

"This you know, my beloved brethren. But let everyone be quick to hear, slow to speak and slow to anger, for the anger of man does not achieve the righteousness of God." (James 1:19-20)

Can you imagine better advice for getting along with others? How often we hear it said that the problem in a family, a plant, an office, a school, or even a church is a breakdown of communication. Obedience to this verse would change all of that.

"Be quick to hear." Listen! Try to understand where the one who is talking "is coming from" and what he or she really means. See if you can repeat what was said so accurately that the one who said it will agree that you have stated the position accurately.

Now, make sure a reply is needed. We do not have to correct every mistake we hear. Some are not serious enough to require attention. Others, though serious, may have to wait for a more suitable time to be corrected.

Even if a reply is needed, take your time. "Be slow to speak." Think of what you are saying. Think how it will sound to the one hearing it and how it will sound if it is repeated to someone else. Ask yourself if what you are about to say will do good or do harm. Ask God to help you to say only what needs to be said. Nehemiah was asked a question by the king and managed a prayer before he answered (Nehemiah 2:4-5). Remember that once you have spoken, you cannot recall your words.

Above all, "be slow to anger." Anger almost always breaks down communication; shouting matches seldom end in a better understanding of each other. And, besides jeopardizing human relationships, they endanger our relation with God. We may fancy that our anger is "righteous indignation," but the Holy Spirit says: "The anger of man does not achieve the righteousness of God."
