The World Needs Lights

Viruses. Racism. Injustice. Riots. Financial upheaval.

It is tempting to think that things have never been worse, yet our field of vision over the course of time is very narrow. The reality is human existence has always been filled with all of the above, along with earthquakes, tsunamis, tornados, famines, awful diseases, conquests, pillagings, dominations, food and water shortages, mosquitoes, snakes, lions and tigers, and bears... and the lists go on and on.

Reasons to be upset, scared, anxious, concerned, frustrated and the like are nothing new. They have been the constant companions of the human experience and while we travel this earth, they always will.

Despite these realities, the Bible holds several enticing possibilities before us: we can have hope (Psalm 42:11; 62:5-6; Romans 15:13; 1 Timothy 4:10), joy (Psalm 16:11; John 15:10-12; Galatians 5:22-23) and peace with others (Psalm 34:13-15; Isaiah 32:16-17; Luke 2:13-14; Romans 12:17-18; 1 Corinthians 13:11)—even in this life. It does not give us these things by taking us out of the world, but by giving us tools to use while in this world. What are these tools?

There are numerous passages we could look to, but let's spend a few minutes contemplating Paul's exhortation to the Philippians: "Do all things without grumbling or disputing, that you may be blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and twisted generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world, holding fast to the word of life..." (Philippians 2:14-16).

Under inspiration, Paul gives us some simple, doable actions we can put into place in our lives. First, he tells us not to complain. All of us complain from time to time. Sometimes, those complaints move from "time to time" to all the time. Spend some time this week paying attention to your speech; look over your social media posts. Be honest. How much do you see yourself complaining? It may be more than you think.

We can post all the Bible verses we like on Facebook or Instagram, but when we complain—especially when people know we are a Christian—we aren't showing the world that we are any different than anyone else. So, check your complaining. Complaints stem from too close a proximity to the world. Paul's attitude (and Christ's for that matter) was radical because he focused on different things: "So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal" (2 Corinthians 4:16-18).

When you make the decision to stop being negative, you must follow that up with an equal decision to being positive—shine as a light. Point people from the chaos of the world to the love and peace of God. You aren't being self-righteous when you decide to model this; people need to see that it really is possible to have the peace that "surpasses all understanding" (Philippians 4:7) in the "midst of a crooked and twisted generation." People need to hear that injustices are real, that life stinks sometimes, but when one sets their mind on God in obedience, it really can change one's life and outlook. We need to be living proof of this.

Finally, all of this is made possible because you "hold fast to God's word." Every day we are all tempted to cast aside the Biblical teachings to some degree or another. Don't. Always remember that real freedom comes from following God and His word (Romans 6:15-19). The more we submit to God's wisdom rather than our own, the more peace we will have. Hold on desperately to God and His word.

God needs a hitter this week in this game we call life. Let's step up to the plate.

"Come Before Winter"

The first day of winter, for the northern hemisphere, occurs on the "winter solstice." This year, winter solstice occurs on December 21st. Winter is a slower, more restful time for some households. There are no flowers to plant, grass to cut, and leaves to rake. Outdoor sports slow down in the cold. It gets dark early making for earlier evenings. While winter prohibits us from certain actions, it opens the door to other opportunities as well. So, instead of looking at winter with the dread of the bleak cold and darkness we can optimistically consider its value.

Enduring winter reminds us of a comment Paul makes in the final chapter of his last epistle to Timothy, "Do your utmost to come before winter" (2 Timothy 4:21). In fact, if we look at the context of this passage we will find three simple things Paul wanted as he prepared for the winter ahead.

He wanted spiritual companions. Winter can be a depressing time for some. The seasonal "winter blues" can make winter difficult. Facing the holidays is not always enjoyable for those who are grieving, lonely, or who have fractured families. Brothers and sisters in Christ can offer us encouragement during these difficult times. This is why Paul says to Timothy, "Be diligent to come to me quickly" and "Get Mark and bring him with you" in the context (2 Timothy 4:9,11). Paul wanted spiritual encouragers during the winter ahead before travel by sea was impossible. Of course, for Paul, this may have been the last opportunity to see these spiritual helpers (cp. 2 Timothy 4:6-8). Who can you give needed companionship to this winter?

He wanted to be warm. Paul writes to Timothy, "Bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas when you come..." (4:13). Paul writes from a cold prison with few luxuries (1:8). So, the basic necessities were needful. As we think of others during this bitter cold of winter may we do what we can to ensure others have their basic needs cared for (cp. Matthew 25:36; James 4:14-17). The "worthy woman" was "not afraid of snow for her household" because she ensured they had proper clothing (Proverbs 31:21). Worthy Christians look out for those who are poor and destitute to ensure they are properly clothed as well.

He wanted to be able to write and study. Paul adds, "Bring...the books, especially the parchments" (2 Timothy

4:13). Winter may slow things down so we have more time to read and write and meditate. Paul planned to use the winter season to do more research and writing as time allowed. May we also use this slower season to spend more time reading about God's Word and using our pen and parchment to journal our thoughts or to encourage others. What can you accomplish during the slow season of winter you fail to accomplish in the busier seasons? Use the slower time to read God's Word and to purposefully write to edify and encourage others. Spring will be here before you know it. In the meantime, use your winter wisely.

They need hope that they are loved, hope they have worth, hope they are going to make it, and hope that God's strength is theirs to claim.

We must get down into the trenches with people. Encouragement is the core of edification and love is the core of encouragement. Do people know we care? Simple question.

There is a balm in Gilead. There is hope in the cross.

There is life-giving [amazing] grace.

There is forgiving power in the blood.

There is hope-filled water to refresh your soul.

"Rest of the weary, joy of the sad..." Hope. We must give hope to the hurting. Hope that says... He cares (and so do we).
