God's Demonstration of His Love

"But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" — (Romans 5:8).

Paul makes a most remarkable and profound statement as he writes about God's love for man to the Romans. Have you ever considered what God did to demonstrate His love for us? We may often consider the creation as a demonstration of God's love for us. Indeed, the creation is a marvelous gift of God to man. But the supreme demonstration of God's love for us is clearly seen in the gift of His Son. Imagine how God was grieved to offer His Son to be beaten, whipped, and hung on a Roman cross to allow us to live with Him. That is indeed a supreme demonstration of His love. Let us consider things that were necessary for God to do this.

The Necessity of the Cross. The problem for man was his sin. Sin was the separator between God and man (Isaiah 59:1-2). Paul describes the condition of man as "For while we were still weak..." (Romans 5:6). Why is man weak? Because he is guilty of sin. Paul said, "There is none righteous, no, not one" or, "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:10, 23). The life of perfection is not where man is, and God knows it. But God's tremendous love for man caused Him to offer His own Son as the sacrifice for our sins due to our weakness. We should live looking to the cross and the demonstration of love that God showed for us to be forgiven of our sins and be saved. The cross was a necessity for God to save us. How that should motivate us in our lives to live for Christ.

The Surprise of the Cross. It is the surprise of the cross that we cannot understand. Paul states the thought of men, saying, "For scarcely for a righteous man will one die; yet perhaps for a good man someone would even dare to die" (Romans 5:7). God who can do all things, possessing all power, having all knowledge, why could there not be another way to save us than God becoming man and hanging on the cross in my place. The thought of the cross is a surprise in every way. But we often

put ourselves in God's place, and we do not see the vast depth of His love for us. Time and again, we sin and fall short of what God expects of us, but as we turn back to God, He forgives us. Why does God do that? Because of His love demonstrated at the cross and the price paid at the cross for us.

The Demonstration of the Cross. The cross is a full demonstration of God's love. We may say we love our spouses, children, families, and brethren, but stating it does not demonstrate it. We demonstrate our love by showing it in our actions toward those we love. God showed His love for us by sending His Son to die on the cross. God demonstrated His toward us at the cross and now demonstrates His love through us. As the love of the cross transforms us, we allow the world to see the love of God in our response to life. How we treat our families, those we work with, and our brothers and sisters in Christ demonstrates to the world the love of God. Life is rough and unfair, but the love of God does not diminish for us, and we can demonstrate it to the world.

May we see the demonstration of God's love and humbly submit our lives to His service.

A Hairy Reminder

A person between the ages of 20—30 has about 615 hair follicles per square centimeter. A person 50 years of age has around 485 hair follicles per square centimeter. Typically, most people have somewhere between 100,000 —150,000 hairs on their head. By the way, the average hair loss for an individual is 50—100 hairs per day. As a result, there is no way you can tell accurately how many hairs you have (in fact, unless you are going bald, most of us don't really care). But God knows.

Jesus said: "Are not two sparrows sold for a cent? And yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Therefore do not fear; you are of more value than many sparrows" (Matthew 10:29-31). This passage reveals three interesting truths. First, Godknows more about us than we know about us. That is a humbling thought. When we sometimes feel like no one understands us or grasps our situation, we forget that God does. God knows your personality. God knows your strengths. God knows what motivates you. God knows when you stumble. God knows what you like and don't like. God knows the real you. Therefore, when God declares something worthwhile, He knows what He is talking about. When God warns about danger, He knows what He is talking about. When God tells us that we should do something, we need to do it, because He knows us better than we know ourselves.

God is a God of detail. How insignificant are hairs and sparrows to us. Yet God is aware of them. He is a God of details. The motives, attitudes and heart behind our actions are as important to Him as the actions themselves. It does little good to give, if you have left out the detail of being a cheerful giver. Singing fails if we neglect thankfulness in our heart. Let us be a people of details, as God is.

God cares about you. This is why Jesus referred to sparrows and hair. We are of value to Him. Christ was not sent to save the whales, the environment, or the endangered species, but mankind. Man has value! Stress and worry often make us wonder if God cares. These two simple illustrations remind us that He does. ~via Northside Bulletin; Jonesboro, Arkansas.

How Edom Lost, But Won

"Amaziah . . . did what was right . . . but not with a loyal heart" — (2 Chronicles 25:1,2)

When Edom posed a threat to Judah, King Amaziah did what a king should do: he raised an army to meet the threat, which included 100,000 mercenaries from the northern kingdom of Israel. When a prophet brought word from God that the northerners were not to go with Judah to the fight—who needs Israel when God is on your side (25:7–8)?!—Amaziah sent the Israelites home. Leading only his Judeans, Amaziah won a great victory over the Edomites in the Valley of Salt (somewhere in the vicinity of Petra).

But then we read, "Now it was so, after Amaziah came from the slaughter of the Edomites, that he brought the gods of the people of Seir, set them up to be his gods, and bowed down before them and burned incense to them" (25:14). On the opponent's home turf (the Valley of Salt, Petra) and against all odds, Judah won the game going away. Then they hire Edom's coach. Does it get more insane than that?

The Chinese have a saying that in war, enemies tend to swap vices. And it's true: in fighting an evil we can easily become evil. Amaziah crushed Edom's army but adopted Edom's gods. And the reason they did is revealed in the second verse: Amaziah did right, but his heart wasn't in it, and eventually, what was in his heart came out. It doesn't matter if we've conquered paganism on the battlefield if paganism has penetrated and conquered our heart.

God enabling, I want to go to Obadiah next week and talk about the Edomites'sin that led to their crushing defeat.
