“Be Still and Know That I Am God”

“Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth!” — (Psalm 46:10).

Our culture is so driven that having peace may seem to be unimaginable. People are so consumed with having what they desire that many cannot even think of what would be better for the other person. The news is filled with tragedy after tragedy of people inflicting their ways upon others. Jesus came to give peace to man, but men still continue to exert themselves constantly and produce many troubles in life that will not allow them to know peace. God, speaking through the Psalmist, tells us, “Cease striving and know that I am God.” Many may say, “I am not striving with God, I love Him and I am faithful to Him.” However, we struggle with God in many ways we do not think about. Let us notice four aspects of God in this Psalm we would do well to remember and to put our lives in sync with God and cease to strive with Him.

God is Our Protector (vs. 1-3). The Psalmist reminds us about three things of God’s protection:

- *God is our refuge* – the place of protection is with God.
- *Strength* – the source of protection is from God, the Almighty.
- *Present help in trouble* – the availability of rescue is always there for us.

What a blessing; the people of God have to know that God is our protector, but we need to “Be still” to remember that God is there for us.

God is Our Provider – (vs. 4-5). We often get caught up in the desire to be self-sufficient. But we need to remember that every good thing we have comes from God (James 1:17). Jesus taught that we do not need to live our life striving after the things of life. God will provide the things we need (Matthew 6:19-34). Paul told the people in Athens it was in God that they “live and move and have our being” (Acts 17:28). We need to “Be still” and quit relying on our own strength and see that it is God who provides.

God is the Source of Power. People crave power and personal gain.

Everybody wants to call the shots. We thrive over power and what we can do with it. We need to stop and recognize our need for God's power. God is the source of power; in the creation, salvation, and resurrection of Christ. God is also the source of power that is working in us as we allow Him to rule our lives. In the battles we face against evil, God provides us with the weapons and protection we need to overcome (Ephesians 6:10-13). Let us see the true source of power that only comes from God.

God is the Peacemaker – (vs. 8-11). The Psalmist says, "He makes wars cease...He breaks the bow and cuts the spar in two" (Psalm 46:9). The only lasting peace to ever be known is the peace that comes God's way. The world is always looking for peace, but wars and violence continue. But when men come to stand still and come to know God, they will come to find true lasting peace.

Remember what God tells us "Be still and know that I am God." In doing that, we will see the protection, the providence, the source of power, and the peace that comes from God.



Comforting Those Who Suffer & Grieve

"...The Father of compassion and the God of all comfort comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God." (2 Corinthians 1:3-4).

A recent Bible class discussion focused on what we learn about suffering from the Old Testament book of Job. Prominent in the discussion were Eliphaz, Bildad and Zophar. When these friends of Job are introduced to us at the end of chapter 2, they are model comforters, but later Job rightfully calls them "miserable comforters" (16:2).

As model comforters, they sat with Job, grieved with Job, and when they saw that Job's grief and suffering left him speechless, they were willing to just-be-present, sitting in silence for a whole week (Job 2:11-13). Unfortunately,

when they did speak, they forgot that what Job needed at that time was comfort. Instead, they assumed things about Job's past life, the causes of his suffering, and the activity of God that they could not know. This led to their becoming "miserable comforters," who were neither a blessing to Job nor a glory to God.

I'm guessing that all who read this want to excel at comforting those who suffer and grieve. Consequently, we worry about saying the wrong thing. That worry is bad if it keeps us from reaching out. It's good if it helps us avoid using trite phrases that may hurt more than help and may even be at odds with the truth of Scripture. "I know exactly how you feel" – really? "God just needed another angel" – is that how it works? "It was God's will" – is this more likely to encourage or discourage the person grieving the loss of a job, health or a loved one? Usually, the best thing to say is the simplest: "I'm sorry." "I'm praying for you." "I love you."

Preacher-blogger, Steve Higginbotham, gives the following helpful advice:

Give them your presence. Don't allow a person to suffer alone. Understand that you don't have to say anything. Just be there. A hug; an expression of sorrow; and a reaffirmation of your love for them is all that you need to say. Your presence is what will be remembered and treasured, not your words.

Don't stress over words. No words can fix the situation, so drop the burden of feeling you must think of the "perfect thing to say." There is no sage advice to offer at this moment that will make everything better.

Be there when the dust settles. We often inundate the grieving family with support during the immediate time of loss, but who is ministering to this family two months later? Determine to be the person who is ministering two months, four months, six months after the funeral.

Remember dates. Mark your calendar and make note of birthdays, anniversaries, and especially the anniversary date of the person's death. I assure you that the anniversary of a person's death will not be overlooked by their loved ones. Let the grieving know that others remember, too.

Do good. Don't simply offer to do good, actually do it. Sometimes we find ourselves saying, "If there's anything you need, just let me know." This offer, even if sincere, will rarely be acted upon. Instead, if you re-

ally want to offer help, say something like, "Would you rather me run to the store for some groceries, or do the dishes for you?" This wording is much more likely to allow you the opportunity to minister.

Follow these suggestions to be better equipped to comfort others with the comfort God has given you (2 Corinthians 1:3-4).your God with all your heart and soul and mind, this will be your pleasure.
