# The Three Disciples

"The Elder, To the beloved Gaius, whom I love in truth..." (3 John 1)

In John's third letter, he mentions Gaius, to whom the letter is addressed, and then mentions two other brethren in the epistle. The three brethren named in this letter are three distinct types of individuals. Let us consider the lessons we can learn from these men.

The Beloved Gaius. Gaius is a common name in the New Testament. We see the name in the book of Romans, First Corinthians, and twice in Acts. However, we cannot definitely identify if this Gaius was any of these others mentioned. However, there are three qualities of character that we can remember about Gaius.

- *A Beloved Life He Lived.* Three times John called him "beloved" (verses 1, 2, and 5). Gaius had cultivated character traits that made him attractive to the apostle John.
- *ADevotion To Truth.* We see John's attitude toward truth as he writes, "For I rejoiced greatly when brethren came and testified of the truth that is in you, just as you walk in the truth. I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth" (3 John 3-4).
- A Life Given To Hospitality. John commends Gaius for his generosity and hospitality. "Beloved, you do faithfully whatever you do for the brethren and for strangers, who have borne witness of your love before the church. If you send them forward on their journey in a manner worthy of God, you will do well, because they went forth for His name's sake, taking nothing from the Gentiles. We therefore ought to receive such, that we may become fellow workers for the truth" (3 John 5-8).

What three great qualities we can see John pointing out about Gaius. There are three qualities we all need to apply to our life.

The Stark Contrast of Gaius Is Diotrephes. The character of Diotrephes is marked by two traits:

• A Love For Self. John describes Diotrephes as "loves to have the preeminence among them" (3 John 9). In other words, Diotrephes

- only occupied the positions he could be first. He believed that all consideration should be given to him while not giving any consideration to another.
- An Intolerance for Others. The first trait led to the second trait in that Diotrophes "does not receive us." John goes on to say, "Therefore, if I come, I will call to mind his deeds which he does, prating against us with malicious words, And not content with that he himself does not receive the brethren, forbids those who wish to, putting them out of the church" (3 John 10).

John dislikes these two traits of Diotrephes, admonishing, "do not imitate what is evil, but what is good" (2 John 11).

The Good Example of Demetrius. John follows Diotrephes with the man of principle and character, Demetrius. There are three things John calls out about this good brother (3 John 12-13).

- *A Good Testimony of All Men*. All men can appreciate that which is good. John declares that Demetrius is such a man that all affirm his goodness.
- A Testimony of the Truth. Demetrius receives a witness of his life from the truth.
- A Testimony of John. John commends Demetrius saying, "And we also bear witness, and you know that our testimony is true." How much this meant to have such a man of character as John speak so highly of someone. Indeed, Demetrius was an excellent, faithful brother and example for others.

As John closes this short letter, he declares that he had many things to write, but he did take the time to write this letter and name these three men. Let us recognize the valuable lessons for our lives that we can learn from such brief instruction.

# Be An Encourager

"What would you do differently if you had your life to live over again?" A young lady asked the Duke of Wellington in his old age. The Duke—who had defeated Napoleon at Waterloo in 1815 and later served as Prime Minister of the United Kingdom—was known as a brilliant, yet very demanding man. He wasn't known to "shower his subordinates with compliments." However, when asked this question, he thought for a moment, then replied, "I'd give more praise."

George M. Adams called encouragement "oxygen to the soul." Nothing breathes new life into a discouraged person like an encouraging word or deed. Dr. Samuel Johnson observed, "The applause of a single human being is of great consequence." "Correction does much, but encouragement does more," once wrote the German poet Goethe. In his fine book, The Power of Encouragement, Dr. David Jeremiah compared encouragement to someone whose car will not start because its weakened battery has lost its charge. But then another person comes alongside and gives it a jump-start. "The strength of the operative car is transferred into the weak battery, and the inoperative car is rejuvenated into action." That's the power of encouragement.

The Bible often speaks of the importance of encouragement. The prophet Isaiah exhorted God's people to "encourage the oppressed" (1:17). "Encourage one another daily," urged the writer of Hebrews (3:13). "We urge you, brothers," penned Paul to the Thessalonian church, "warn those who are idle, encourage the timid, help the weak, be patient with everyone" (1 Thessalonians 5:14). With so many things around us that are discouraging, it's easy to become a discourager. Instead, let's decide to look for some simple, specific ways we can encourage others. Here are a few ideas...

- If you notice something good, say something. Don't let shyness hold you back. If you see something you appreciate or admire, mention it. Nothing is too small.
- Think about what encourages you, then practice that in your daily interactions with others.
- When you offer words of praise, be specific, not generic. Point out a concrete attitude, action, or quality you admire and appreciate.

- Practice praise at home. Tell your family how and why you appreciate them.
- Develop the habit of saying "thank you," even for the small things people do.
- Set a goal to encourage three people every day outside of your home.
- When in a small group setting, look for ways to offer appreciation to each person who contributes to the group.
- When someone encourages you, let them know. Refrain from being a professional critic. We have enough of those. Quit looking for something wrong, and look for something right... something you can praise.
- Offer a smile to everyone you meet.

The late public speaker Cavet Robert once opined, "Three billion people on earth go to bed hungry every night, but four billion people go to bed every night hungry for a simple word of encouragement and recognition." Finally, these words by leadership guru John Maxwell ought to speak to every preacher, pastor, parent and person who leads others: "If you are a leader, you should never forget that everyone needs encouragement. And everyone who receives it—young or old, successful or less-than-successful, unknown or famous—is changed by it."

"Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing" (1 Thessalonians 5:11).
