Paul's Perspective on His Departure

"For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but to all who loved His appearing" (2 Timothy 4:6-8).

Paul is writing to Timothy near his life's close and knows he has faithfully served the Lord. It is in mindset Paul faces his impending death with confidence. He looks beyond the pain and sorrow in death to see the joy of salvation that he has lived and served to receive. He reminds Timothy that the salvation he sees on the horizon is available to all who will surrender their lives for the love of Christ and allow Him to rule on the throne of their hearts. Paul offers an excellent perspective on life and how he gave himself as an offering to the Lord.

Paul Fought the Good Fight. Paul understood that the life of the Christian is a life that will have its battles. Paul wrote, "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against powers, against rulers or the darkness of the age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places" (Ephesians 6:12). Indeed, we see how Paul saw the things that were battles for the Christian. Satan is working and using many forces to cause Christians to succumb to sin. Paul fought these battles in his life and referred to it as the "good fight." Why was the fight good? It is an honorable fight for truth and righteousness. We engage in this fight because Jesus Christ is ruling, reigning, and has dominion in our lives. Paul reminds Timothy about the good fight in life.

Paul Finished the Race. It is a notable fact that Paul states that he finished the race. Paul had known many others who had run the race, but they had failed to finish. Some people may have run the race better than others. However, your standing before the Lord is based on how we run our race rather than how others run their race. Quite regularly, we will hear people compare their service to the Lord based on how others are serving the Lord. Paul is reminding Timothy, as well as us, that we all must run our race. The Hebrew writer states, "let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1). Running the race of life will require patience, endurance, and diligence to complete the race. It is what we see in the life of Paul.

Paul Kept the Faith. Paul states that he "kept the faith." With all the assaults hurled at Paul in his life as a Christian, he never backed away from his commitment to Jesus Christ through the trials, beatings, imprisonments, attacks from the Jews, attacks from brethren, etc. Paul was never deterred from his work for the Lord. He had reminded Timothy earlier:

- "Guard what was committed to your trust" (1 Timothy 6:20).
- "Hold fast the pattern of sound words which you have heard from me, in faith and love which are in Christ Jesus" (2 Timothy 1:13).

The gospel is of the greatest value and worthy of every Christian's protection. Paul is declaring that as he comes to the time of his departure. Let us remember to keep or guard the faith in our lives.

The extraordinary statement of hope is what Paul's life has relied upon. He will receive the "crown of righteousness" because of living a life with Christ ruling his heart. However, we do not need to overlook that this hope is not only for Paul but for all who love the appearing of Christ. Do we love His appearing? Are we faithfully serving Him? If not, make that change today!

The Other Sacrifice

To tell people that Jesus Christ left heaven to come to earth to be our Savior doesn't make as much of an impact if they don't know what a sacrifice it was to come to earth. I am not talking about the sacrifice of Him dying on the cross. I am talking about what our Lord left behind to come to this world.

He left Heaven.

Here on earth, we are doing all we can to get to heaven, yet the Son of God left that abode to help us. There is no pain, sickness or dying in heaven (Rev. 21:3-4). The reason Jesus came was to make a way for us to be with the Father (Jn. 14:1-6). Our God is in heaven and that's where Jesus was (Jn. 1:1,14). It is hard to imagine leaving a place so glorious to come to a sin infested world that can never be compared to heaven.

He left His Father.

The scriptures clearly state that Christ was "with God" (Jn. 1:1). The fact that Jesus was a man of prayer reveals the relationship He and the Father have – they are one (Jn. 17:21). Understand that I am not saying that Jesus as a rebellious child would leave. On the contrary, Christ left to do the will of His Father (Lk. 2:49) knowing He would not be present with the Father in heaven.

He left heaven to become a servant.

The only begotten Son took the form of a bondservant (Philippians 2:7). One might think that it would not be a difficult task for Christ to become a servant because He is God. Perhaps that is true. However, this article is not written to demonstrate how easy it was for our Lord to sacrifice. The point is that it was a sacrifice. The whole idea of coming as a servant is to help us see that He didn't come to this world the easy way. He made Himself of no reputation (Philippians 2:7). Joseph and Mary were not a king and queen where Christ could be raised in a palace with all the comforts that can be obtained in the world. He was born in a stable (Luke 2:7) and even when He began His earthly ministry, He had no place to lay His head (Matthew 8:20).

He left heaven knowing what lies before Him.

The whole plan of Jesus coming to earth for the purpose of dying wasn't "plan B." Jesus came from heaven to go to the cross (Luke 18:31-33). This helps us to understand what Christ was going through in the garden prior to His death (Matthew 26). He knew what was about to happen. Jesus knew this was the plan before the foundation of the world (Ephesians 1:3-4). What is amazing is that He came knowing this. That, in and of itself, is a great sacrifice!

He left knowing His sacrifice would be appreciated by only a few.

How sad it is to even think about the sacrifice of leaving heaven knowing that the majority of the people who you came to help will reject you (Matthew 7:13-14,

21-23). This isn't meant to minimize the few that would devote themselves to serving the Lord. The point is that Jesus came for the whole world (John 3:16). He came to save everyone (Mark 16:15; 2 Peter 3:9). Unfortunately, before the Lord even left His abode in heaven, He was aware of what would be gained in the end. The lesson for us: He came anyway.

He left knowing He would have to face and reject every temptation.

The salvation of the world depended upon the fact that a perfect sacrifice was required (1 Peter 1:18-20). Christ faced all the temptations we face, yet never broke any of God's laws (Hebrews 4:15). While Jesus did sacrifice Himself on the cross, let us not forget the other sacrifice of leaving heaven.
